You will have some homework throughout this unit. Therefore, we are asking Learning Coaches to partner with us as we complete our final writing assignment.

In this packet you will find printable tools to help us stay organized and focused. If you cannot print the worksheets you can make your own on blank sheets of paper or write it in your notebook.

There are many steps to this research project. Please make sure your student is keeping all his/her work in his/her notebook!

You will choose an animal of your interest, research the animal (as homework), type your paper, report your findings by File Sharing the document with your teacher by 4pm on March 17th. On this last assignment you will be allowed to type the document. Your teacher will then compile our class reports into a book. The book will be available online for you to view, share with family, and have an option to buy.

Please remember you need 85% attendance in class connects in order for you to mark units complete at the end of this study. If you must miss please make sure you watch the recordings. I will be instructing students step by step on the project and reporting any homework assignments at the end of each class. 

Does my writing have a title?			
Did I re-read my writing out loud to check for mistakes? L.C: Listen; if you hear something that doesn't sound right, ask, "Does that sound right?"			
Did I start each sentence with a capital letter?			
Did I end each sentence with a period, an exclamation point, or a question mark?			
Did I space my words and write neatly?			
Did I indent at the beginning of each paragraph?			
Did I circle any words that I think are misspelled in my rough draft?			
Did I look in the dictionary, use dictionary.com or ask my L.C. for help spelling words?			
Did I use adjectives (spicy words)? Did you check for boring words?			
L.C: Perhaps suggest student look at Banish Boring Words packet. Did I use strong verbs? Is there action in my story?			
Did you use your five senses: feel, smell, taste, hear, see?			
Do I have strong leads that introduce the story? Do each of my sentences start differently?			
Is your writing focused? The ideas and content of my story match the topic?			
Is my writing organized? Does my story have a beginning, middle, and end? L.C: Ask your student to identify out each piece.			
Did I use transitional words: first, next, then, last?			
Does my story have voice? Does it sound like you?			
Do you have a conclusion sentence that wraps it all up? L.C: Ask your student if they have closed/ended the topic or if they are leaving the audience wondering.			
Did you type a clean and neat final draft? Is it the best writing I can do?			
L.C: The student might need to write a few drafts before it is a polished writing.
